

Is North Korea a country?

North Korea,[d]officially the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK),[e]is a countryin East Asia. It constitutes the northern half of the Korean Peninsula and borders China and Russia to the north at the Yalu (Amnok) and Tumen rivers,and South Korea to the south at the Korean Demilitarized Zone.
